From the Outside Looking In

I just got in from the Prison Congregations of America gathering in Atchison, Kansas, last night, and I'm going to be processing it all for a while--not just the information that I received but the way that the people I met told the story of what we do in and through prison ministry.

It all began, in fact, before the actual conference, on the plane to Kansas City. I was seated next to a very large man who introduced himself as someone who was traveling for work and had the "worst job in the world." So, of course I asked, "What makes it the worst job in the world?" He explained that he works in a meat rendering plant, where poultry, beef and pork are butchered, processed and shipped out. His days are full of long hours, heat, and stench. When I asked if that made him a vegetarian, he smiled and opened the pizza box on his lap—meat lovers!—and offered me a slice.

He said his job stunk (literally) but he was happy to have it because of his "past." He went on to talk about how he had spent most of his adolescent years

incarcerated, then again in his twenties for the "terrible things I've done." I asked him about his life then, his life now, his journey. The words just spilled out and he spoke of his shame, of how he was trying to stay sober and hard working, of the toddler son he hoped to set a good example for.

I didn't need to say much; I think he just needed some permission to unburden his pain and a little affirmation for the courageous steps forward he's taken. He talked about his spiritual journey—how he had found the strength to keep going through faith in God, but was having a hard time finding a church because "so many churches don't follow the Bible—like, they have lady pastors."

He kept talking, and I kept discovering a child of God, a brother in Christ, a convicted felon, who was moving through pain, and working out his progress one day at a time. He wondered out loud if he could ever prove himself to God, but also to himself. We talked a lot about that, and when the plane landed he said I "made sense" and he'd like to keep in touch. So, I gave

him my business card and said, "Ok, but I'm one of those lady pastors ... and a prison pastor." A wide and warm smile came over his face and he said he suspected that.

I heard Gospel there in the air between BWI and Kansas City-- the Gospel according to a "random" person I met on a plane, and a fitting beginning to a time of learning and sharing about ministries to those who have been in prison and, with God's help, are finding a way to move forward from there. The Gospel continued to be told over the course of the next few days. I heard the Gospel through the amazing stories of mingled pain and joy told of prison ministry in all its forms. I heard the Gospel through the quiet and tireless hospitality of the Benedictine sisters at the retreat center at Mt. St. Scholastica. I heard the Gospel in the lovely singing at the daily prayer services where the sisters and the retreatants all raised voices together to become one voice. I heard the Gospel in the laughter as we played games way too late into the night. I absorbed some information, got some valuable resources, and made contact with dedicated ministers with a wealth of experience and heart for the incarcerated and returning citizens. And it all happened, as the Gospel always does, through human beings and their stories: truly the word of God incarnate, over and over. I hope and pray you hear the Gospel in the next person you encounter.
